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BLOUINARTINFO Penny Slinger Opens Solo Show in Tokyo

TOKYO — British artist Penny Slinger opens her first ever solo exhibition in Japan at Blum & Poe, beginning February 14.

Slinger's extensive oeuvre explores the self-image of the modern women as seen through the lens of mysticism, the subconscious, and Tantric philosophy. Her works deploy a wide range of symbols within colorful photographic collages that portray women as divine goddesses, enlightened and sexually liberated beings, and enigmatic, oracle-like figures.

This exhibition showcases two central series. "An Exorcism," which began as a book dating from 1977, depicts both female and male figures wandering the interior of a decrepit Gothic mansion located in the English countryside. In these haunting, allegorical pieces, the cavernous mansion serves as a stand-in for the dominant patriarchal system, within which each individual figure seeks to redeem the Self through a process of self-psychoanalysis.

Elsewhere, "Mountain Ecstasy" (1978) is a delirious meditation on the principles of Tantric alchemy, sexual nirvana according to occult philosophy, and ancient Egyptian conceptions of the divine goddess — what Slinger herself calls "the joy of entering the Technicolor dream with the restrictions gone: none of the bondage, just liberation and freedom."
